FAMILY

Two weights with an italic for the heavier.

FONT FACTS

Based on bronze lettering of the designer. When his drawings proved unsatisfactory to him, Wolpe resorted to rubbings of the original bronze cuttings. Only available as an all-cap titling face when first released. The lowercase was added eight years later.

FAMILY

Four weights with italics for three and two condensed designs with italics for one. Special designs for small text sizes.

FONT FACTS

A custom design for *The Times* of London newspaper. Developed as machine set faces for Monotype and Linotype equipment. Strong similarities to Plantin, but with finer serifs. While the most used serif typeface today, it took over 20 years for the face to find popularity outside of the UK.
